Vernonville

In 1860, the hamlet of Vernonville was named after Charles H. Vernon. A portion of his 100acre farm became sixty newly surveyed lots that primarily became homesteads, but also a Church, general store, post office, blacksmith shop, various other shops, and two halls.

The very picturesque Church, built in 1862 and originally Presbyterian, but later United, still stands in a lovely treed setting in the heart of the village. The site was purchased for 10 pounds in 1861 from Vernon's Estate. While regular services are no longer held, the Church is opened annually every second Sunday in June for a

memorial service. "Back in the day", annual ice cream socials were understandably popular. Homemade ice cream waited safely in one of four large Church freezers.


Vernonville's first school, S.S. #9, dates back to 1814, and served families along the newly opened road between Vernonville Road and Shelter Valley Road. Later, S.S. #14 began as a log school in 1846, and evolved into a brick building, which today is the town's community hall. The school continued to 1966. In 1852, a world map was purchased for 17 shillings and

6 pence, and a map of Canada for 7 shillings and 6 pence. Annual Arbour Day celebrations in May saw schoolchildren tidving the school and schoolvard, and making up flower beds, before enjoying a nice picnic lunch.

The presence of a sawmill is paramount, and Vernonville's Gillespie Mill busily produced flour, oatmeal and barley to the tune of 100 barrels per day. It was the *only* mill west of Montreal that produced oatmeal and barley. Customers from as far off as Kingston took these grains back home with them. Complementing the mill's importance in the area were

four saw mills and a lathe factory, the latter sending its furniture as far afield as the U.S.

The General Store and post office operated from the late 1880's to the 1940's. Storekeepers in the early 1900's wore many hats: making out wills and leases, using 25-cent forms the customer would purchase, and providing haircuts and tooth extractions as needed.
